TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST Dec 2016

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2016.

Trustees

Trustees who served during the year were as follows: -

Treasurer Mrs Katherine Turner MSc MInstF (Dip) Mrs Carole Bell Appointment of Trustees is governed by the Constitution of the Charity.

Investment Powers

The Constitution authorises the Trustees to make and hold investments using the general funds of the Charity, but no such investments are presently held.

Structure, governance and management

The Charity is established by written constitution and its objects are:

The relief of sickness and poverty of elderly, disabled, sick or infirm persons, and their Carers, within the United Kingdom, by offering assistance to enable those in need to secure Respite Care.

The policy of the Charity continues to be to seek additional finance and support to run the Charity for the benefit of current and future beneficiaries. The Trustees delegate the day-to-day responsibility for managing the Charity to the Chief Executive/Administrator Mr Preston Keeling FInstF.

The Charity was registered with the Charity Commission on May 16th 2001.

Reserves

The policy of the Trustees as adopted on December 19th 2004 is to work toward the building of Reserves which it is anticipated would be equal to the likely expenditure of the Charity for a period of six months, this sum is currently estimated to be £65,000 (reviewed annually). Actual Reserves at the commencement of the year covered by this Report stood at £38,426, and at the end of the 2016 Financial Year the amount held in that account, including interest, stood at £62,604. However, £14,000 of the monies in this account are voluntarily ringfenced to replace the Charity's Holiday Caravans should the Trustee Board so decide, this fund is therefore not restricted as such. The reserve account is operated through Scottish Widows Bank plc. The policy is reviewed annually; this year the process was approved by the Trustee Board on November 6th 2016.

Objectives and Summary of activities in their support

As described in our Governing document the objectives of the Charity remain as follows:

The relief of sickness and poverty of elderly, disabled, sick or infirm persons, and their Carers, within the United Kingdom, by offering assistance to enable those in need to secure Respite Care.

In support of the above objectives our main activities during this reporting/accounting period have continued to involve us enabling Carers to obtain alternative care, either in the home or via residential provision, for the person or persons (almost always a close family member) for whom they normally provide assistance so that they may take a much-needed break to recharge their batteries. We continue to work closely with a number of other charities and with an increasing number of various Statutory Authorities, whilst ensuring that our help is in <u>addition</u> to their funding <u>not</u> a replacement.

Recruitment and training of Trustees

Trustees are encouraged to take part in and attend appropriate external training courses as are staff members. Authorisation for such attendance is made by the Chairman. Recruitment of Trustees will take place when further assistance is needed and will be open to any suitable individual regardless of race, religion or sex. Applicants will be interviewed by Two Trustees and if felt suitable will then go before the full Board for final approval. Any new Trustee will be required to take part in an induction course organised by the CEO and Chairman of Trustees and will be issued with a copy of the Charity Commission's 'The Essential Trustee Guide'.

Achievements and performance

This year saw the charity achieving its objectives in several ways key amongst which were,

- Once again, we were delighted to have been able to support many highly stressed unpaid Carers from across the Country to obtain a much-needed break from their caring role. As we have said in previous years the breaks enable many of the Carers to maintain some level of normality in their lives, as it is all too easy for them to become socially isolated.
- As previously reported, our main activity by far remains supporting the provision of a suitable alternative Carer so that the usual Carer can have a well-earned break, our smaller 'Free Holiday for Carers' scheme has continued to grow and the booking level during 2016 was in excess of 90%. It will always be impossible to achieve a 100% booking level as unpaid Carers frequently have unexpected changes in circumstances due to the person(s) they care for becoming more unwell than usual or indeed dying. Through this scheme, we are able to help some families who have several children one of whom has some long-term illness or severe disability We are not only able to provide them with some alternative provision for the disabled child (thereby freeing up time for the parents), but are able to offer the family a break during which they can spend some real quality time with the able-bodied child(ren) who often otherwise get inadvertently overlooked. A significant number of older unpaid Carers caring for a spouse with one form or another of advanced Dementia or some other type of long-term illness/incapacity have been able to use this service to obtain a much-appreciated quality period of rest and recuperation.
- Our staff continue to be under some considerable pressure dealing with an increasing number of
 email and telephone enquiries concerning the availability of Local Authority Funded Respite and
 other related matters. It is plainly the case that the volume of requests for help and advice will
 continue to increase as NHS and Social Services Departments struggle to cope with the
 demands of an ageing community.
- Increased income during the year was largely the result of three unexpected and non-recurrent donations. The Trustees felt it prudent to use some of this money to raise the level of our reserves although it is not their intention to hold more money than makes reasonable sense as they prefer to use funds available to help those in need of Respite now.

Planned actions for 2017

It remains our intention to continue bringing relief to as many individuals and families through Respite Care provision as we can. We continue to concentrate on maintaining and further developing the provision of direct assistance to unpaid Carers in what we expect to be difficult financial circumstances during 2017 and beyond. Our staff are now being regularly invited to speak to other Carers groups and organisations about how we can help them, this activity we propose to continue to support. We anticipate significantly increased problems in obtaining Respite places in Residential Care Homes as we are seeing numbers of Care Homes being asked by the NHS to provide 'step down' facilities for elderly patients who are not yet quite ready to go home without significant support but who do not need a bed in an acute setting. A further unhelpful development is the trend which sees Nursing Homes de-registering and then becoming simple Residential Homes for the Elderly thereby avoiding the need for the provision of a trained nurse on the premises. This reduces the number of homes able to offer Respite to people who need that level of care. Accordingly 2017 may prove very challenging for us when trying to assist Carers.

Statement of Public Benefit

The Trustees of the Respite Association have complied with their duty to have due regard for the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance. The work of the Respite Association benefits significant numbers of unpaid Carers, these being persons who are caring for someone who is terminally ill, long-term sick/physically or mentally disabled. The Charity helps unpaid Carers without any bias regarding sex, age, religion or ethnicity. The help provided benefits not only the Carer but frequently the whole of their family. Many Carers of young disabled or sick children have other children who are unintentionally given less attention than the parents would themselves prefer to be the case due to the needs of the other child, our Respite Care breaks allow the parents to spend quality time with such children. The provision of a Respite Break for a Carer also has a beneficial effect for the person who they usually care for who may otherwise become distressed at the degree of stress (physical and mental) the Carer maybe be suffering.

The Board receives a report from the CEO/Administrator each year addressing any perceived risk. The report for 2016 was presented to the Trustees on November 6th and approved by them. As covered in previous reports the cancer suffered by the Chief Executive/Administrator remains in remission likewise the plan adopted by the Trustees to deal with the situation should a recurrence occur remains in place.

The Charity currently needs to continue building its small reserves in order to meet the targeted sum (see Reserves Policy on page 4 above). Currently the Reserves are held in an Account with Scottish Widows Bank plc; however, it is the intention of The Trustee Board to continue to monitor whether this is the safest and most productive vehicle for its money in this regard a review took place on November 6th 2016.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2016

1 Accounting policies Basis of preparation of accounts

The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed. The accounts are prepared on a Receipts and Payments Basis (but include additional information for transparency purposes).

Income

Voluntary income and donations are accounted for as received by the Charity. No permanent endowments have been received in the period.

Value added tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the Charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Fixed assets/Depreciation

The Charity owns two computers and two printers (one laser, one inkjet), and some basic office equipment. It also owns two Static Caravans one based at the Richmond Holiday Centre in Skegness, Lincolnshire and the other sited at Newton Hall Holiday Centre in Staining near Blackpool. Computer/office equipment is depreciated over 3 years and the caravans over 10 years.

Office Rent

Office accommodation is provided at a greatly subsidised cost by The Holbeach St Marks Community Association. For security and privacy reasons mail is forwarded to the home address of our Administrator.

Caravan Purchase

No further caravan purchases took place during the Financial Year ending December 31st 2016.
